I write to express support for the City of Danville's request for funding through the FY 2027 State and Tribal Assistance Grant appropriations for the Danville Wastewater Treatment Plant Phase II Capacity Improvements Project.

Boyle County continues to experience steady population growth and remains a strong manufacturing hub in central Kentucky. As our community grows, the infrastructure supporting that growth must keep pace.

Regional expansion will soon place additional demand on the Danville wastewater system that serves Boyle County and surrounding communities. The Mercer County Sanitation District recently received authorization through House Bill 563 and Joint Resolution 30 of the 2024 Regular Session for an \$11 million sewer extension project that will add more than 700 new customers to the Danville system. The Lincoln County Sanitation District also anticipates adding more than 700 new sewer connections in the coming years to serve Hustonville, Moreland, and nearby areas along U.S. Highway 127.

In addition, House Bill 5 advances the development of a 51,530 square-foot training facility at the Northpoint Training Center in Mercer County through a partnership between the Kentucky Community and Technical College System and the Kentucky Department of Corrections. This facility will serve approximately 400 individuals annually and will further increase demand on the Danville Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Given this current and projected growth, expanding the Danville Wastewater Treatment Plant is essential to support continued economic development and population growth in Boyle County.

I am writing in support for federal funding for the City of Danville Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvements - Phase 2 Project in Boyle County, Kentucky. This project is essential to maintaining public health, environmental compliance, and economic growth across the region.

The Danville Wastewater Treatment Plant is a regional facility serving the City of Danville, Northpoint Training Center, and sanitation districts in both Lincoln and Mercer Counties. Phase 2 improvements will increase treatment capacity from approximately 6.5 million gallons per day to 9.0 million gallons per day through critical infrastructure additions, including new clarifiers, expanded treatment processes, and upgraded systems.

The facility is currently constrained by capacity limits that restrict new connections and development. The Lincoln County Sanitation District requests that you support the enlargement and rehabilitation of the Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvements (Phase 2) project. As you know, The City of Danville, KY wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) is a regional facility that serves Danville, Northpoint Training Center, the Lincoln County Sanitation District (LCSD), and the Mercer County Sanitation District (MCSD). The WWTP requires additional treatment capacity and other improvements to continue to meet KPDES Permit Limits and comply with Kentucky Division of Water (KDOW) regulations regarding influent flow. The proposed capacity improvements would include mechanical screening facilities, a new oxidation ditch for extended aeration treatment, new secondary clarifiers (2), sludge holding tanks, flow splitter, electrical connections, and associated plumbing.

Our Sanitation District, was formed in 2011 to provide sanitary sewer service for unserved western Lincoln County. This decision was confirmed by a water quality study of the Hanging Fork Watershed (a component of Danville's raw water supply). This study confirmed high levels of E. Coli bacteria in the creek. A later study found that 75-80% of the E Coli in the Hanging Fork were human in origin.

The plan to provide sanitary sewer service to Western Lincoln County only became possible when the City of Danville agreed to treat our wastewater for us. We now have provided sanitary sewer service to 1000 homes and businesses, including the Hustonville Elementary School. With sanitary sewer service, the school was able to decommission their package sewer treatment plant. We are now planning a construction project to serve another 365 customers which will complete sewer service in this area.

With your support, Danville can upgrade its Sewer Treatment Plant which will allow us to serve all of our customers while improving the raw water quality for the City of Danville.

The purpose of this letter is to express support for the City of Danville as it seeks funding for Phase 2 of the Wastewater Treatment Plant Expansion. This project will add approximately 2.5 MGD of capacity to the facility, strengthening the community's infrastructure and its ability to support continued industrial growth and economic development in the region.

Ephraim McDowell Health continues to play a significant role in the economic vitality of the Danville and Boyle County community. The health system employs 2,000 people and invests \$187 million annually in wages & benefits, supporting local families and the regional economy. Local employee spending contributes \$33.5 million, and hospital spending with local businesses totals \$41.5 million, generating an estimated \$78.7 million in overall economic benefit to the community. Ephraim McDowell Health is also investing in the future through \$3.6 million in planned capital projects and \$28 million for its master facility plan, which will create additional local jobs. In addition, the hospital supports government programs through \$5.7 million in provider taxes, while employees contribute \$2.3 million in income and sales taxes. The organization also provides \$1.7 million in financial assistance and charity care annually and supports the community through health improvement initiatives, education of health professionals, and research.

The Ephraim McDowell Health system is a comprehensive, integrated healthcare delivery system that serves more than 119,000 residents from six counties in Central Kentucky. At the core of the system is Ephraim McDowell Regional Medical Center, a non-profit, 222-bed licensed hospital. Our other hospitals are Ephraim McDowell Fort Logan Hospital, a 25-bed critical access hospital located in neighboring Lincoln County (Stanford) and Ephraim McDowell James G. Haggin Hospital, a 25-bed critical access hospital located in neighboring Mercer County (Harrodsburg).

The City of Danville is seeking funding to renovate and upgrade the existing Waste Water Treatment Plant. This is an investment that is critical to maintain and improve our community's essential infrastructure.

Their planned improvements will enhance the City's ability to provide more reliable and higher quality water services. Upgrades and improvements to the facility will strengthen our environment, stay in compliance, and help expand future economic growth within our city and community.

As a part of the hospitality industry with two hotels here in Danville, Kentucky, we contribute significantly to the local community by serving travelers and supporting the local economy. Combined, our two properties provide 148 hotel rooms per night for visitors to the area. Operating a hotel is a costly endeavor, and the upgrades the City plans to implement will help ensure access to the higher-quality water capacity needed as our community continues to grow. With tourism and travel demand increasing, reliable infrastructure—especially water capacity—is essential to maintaining quality operations for both our guests and our facilities.

We are currently building another hotel in Danville to help meet the growing demand for overnight accommodations. This new property will add 85 additional rooms per night, create approximately 30–40 new jobs, and generate an estimated \$3 million in additional revenue, with about \$307,200 returning directly to the community. Many nights throughout the week our hotels are fully sold out, which naturally leads to higher water usage and utility costs. The City's planned expansions and improvements have the potential to help lower our water expenses while allowing us to operate more efficiently and responsibly. Both of our hotels also participate in environmentally friendly programs, where our sustainability scores and inspections are directly influenced by our operational data, making these improvements even more valuable for our ongoing environmental stewardship.

I am writing to respectfully urge your support for federal funding for the Phase II expansion of the City of Danville, Kentucky Wastewater Treatment Plant. This critical project is essential not only to meet regulatory requirements but also to protect public health and support local economic development.

As a nonprofit organization, Pioneer serves an at-risk population by providing meaningful vocational training and employment opportunities to individuals with disabilities and others who face barriers to employment. All of our participants and employees earn wages that help sustain independent living or supplement their benefits.
